The Chicago Tribune soys that the Branch Bank in that city became extinct on the 31st ult., in compliance with a provision of the act of the last legislature, legalising the suspension. The business of the late Branch will be wound up at the old banking rooms in this city, by an agency for that purpose.

The corruption and fraud which has of late years crept into the management of banking institutions, has reached an alarming extent. The demoralising influence of the abuse of the credit system, by which speculators and bold projectors become possessed suddenly of large fortunes, at expense of the industrious, seems to pervade all those who come in contact with the bank, even although they hold subordinate situations, which place them out of the circle of speculation. The example of his superior officers, by encouraging a love of extravagance and a contempt for industry, induced Newcomb to make away with \$50,000 belonging to the confiding stockholders of the Manhattan Bank, a large portion of whom were in circumstances scarcely more than comfortable, while their subordinate servants were rioting in extravagance. This state of things is by no means confined to one bank or to this city; Levis, in Philadelphia, Surtees, in Cincinnati, Dabney, in Richmond, are all instances of the same general truth. Louisville, Kentucky, has recently been excited by rumors in regard to some of the inferior officers in the Bank of Kentucky. We learn from the proper quarter that errors, emounting to about twenty-five hundred dollars, have been detected in the teller's blotter. The general ledger clerk is involved with the teller in the suspicion touching this apparent defalcation. An investiga-tion into the affairs of the bank resulted on the 17th, in an exculpation of the lodger clerk, and the holding the teller to bail in \$5,000. The frauds which have been discovered in different banks during the past year amount to between \$3 to \$4,000,000, a frightful sum when we consider the state of society, which has given rise to it.

The operations of all the banks, from the U. States Bank down to the smallest shinplaster company, have been im bued with the same system of favoritism and speculation, by which a few individuals and their friends and allies, generally brokers, have made use of the funds of the instilies and speculations of differen degrees of magnitude, but always on the principle of heads I win, tails you lose." That is to say, if the speculations turned out profitable, as in 1836, the different eliques and families congregated round each institution, became rich, built splendit palaces, and amassed large fortunes on small salaries. Small brokers became loan contractors -and clerks gave their soirces and kept horses. When the reverse came, and property depreciated, the banks were made to settle with their debtors by taking their fancy property, left with them as collateral, and giving their fa vorites a discharge, and oppressing others to the utmost. This operation in the case of the Schuylkill, Manhattan, and United States banks, has been laid bare to the public The latter concern is still in the hands of the same parties who have mismanaged it, and who are largely indebted to it; and yet, notwiths anding the enormous injury it is daily doing to the business community, there is no popular movement calculated to bring its affairs to a close. Why does not Mr. Willink, who is now in this city to represent the Holland loan of the Morris Canal & Bank, and Robert Stuart, Esq., the State Treasurer of Michigan, demand and tive of Michigan owes it as a duty to the tax payers of that state, to investigate into the safety of the bonds they have given to the Morris Canal. There is no safety in delay. Unless prompt measures are taken, the farmers of Michigan will have to be taxed \$5,000,000, to pay bonds for which they will get no equivalent.

The Bank of the United States has, for the past year, been undisquisedly endeavoring to perpetuate a suspen-sion of specie payments in the United States. Its intrigues with the Governor of Pennsylvania-its movements in New-York, and operations throughout the Union, have all pointed at this object, which would have been obtained, had it not been for the unexpected strength of the New-York and Eastern Banks. When the U. S. Bank failed, all its organs, and the advocates of suspension, were loud in their ridicule of the "futile attempt," as they were pleased to call it, of the New York Banks to sustain themselves ... The lapse of time caused them to change their notes .-Since then they have attempted by arguments, equally as sophistical as their former assertions were ridiculous, to convince the public that an irredeemable paper money is best. They have not unfrequently cited the condition of England during the Bank restriction from 1797 to 1832 as an instance of the successful use of paper money.

The situation of England during that period was pect liar, inasmuch as intercourse with the continent was al-most entirely suspended, and the currency of England was not subjected to the test of comparison with that of the continent. When peace was restored the futility of all attempts by parliamentary resolutions or other expedients, to give a real value to a currency vastly exceeding the wants of the community became apparent. In dealing with foreigners, no expedient could make a note worth but tos, pass for its British nominal value of 20s; and it became established that the system which attempted to coun teract each successive depreciation of money by an in-ereased quantity of paper, was founded upon false principles, and must ultimately end in the destruction of a me-dium of exchange. Prices have not been very well sustained to-day. Buyers refused to give last week 's rates for the same quality of Beeves. Nominally, however, the same prices were paid, but the cattle were much finer.

There were in market, all told, four thousand, two hundred and seventy five beasts, namely, eight hundred beeves, three thousand four hundred sheep and lambs, and seventy five cows and calves. Nearly all these were sold.

Seven hundred Beeves fetched, on the average, \$6.75 a hundred weight. The prices for Cows and Calves ranged from \$25 a \$46 a head, and the Sheep and Lambs were sold at \$1 to \$4.

Cattle are very low now in the interior. We have been informed that good Beeves are daily purchased by the drevers at four and five dollars a hundred weight, which they sell in this city at six to eight dollars. In some instances, they have bought cattle for less money; but have not reduced the prices here.
