The Panama Herald, of June 15th, has advices from Bogota to June 17th .- An insurrection has broken out in the province of Parti and Turquerres. Gen. Franin the province of Parti and Turquerres. Gen. Fran-co proceeded with a force of 500 men to the scene of the rebellion, and succeeded in driving the insurgents from their quarters. It was afterwards discovered that about 400 of them had escaped into Equador, headed by their chief, Zara. Gen. Franco then proceeded to Tuquerrea, where a desperate battle ensued, and ma-ny lives lost on both sides. Many of the rebels were taken prisoners. 
