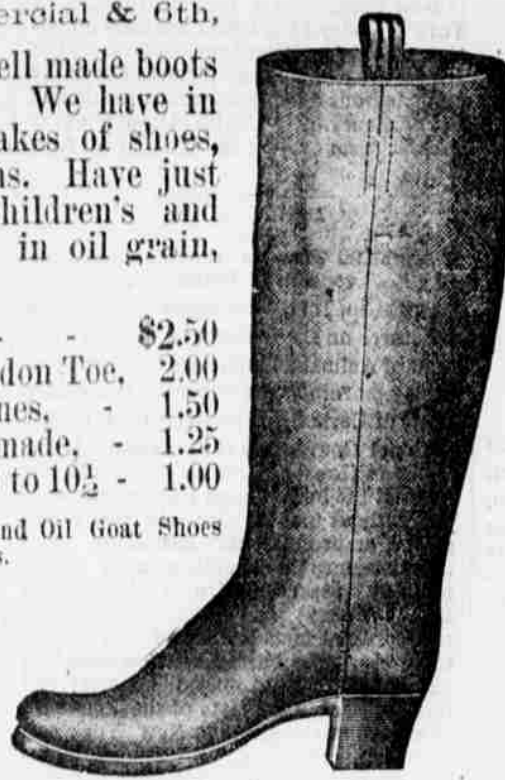

New York, Nov. 15.-Official count does not change the Associated Press account materially. Cleveland still maintains the 1328 plurality; only 12 precincts to hear from. Expect to be through by to-morrow. Cleveland-Prudential without doubt.

Cleveland and Hendricks' Jubilee.

It having been rendered certain, beyond a reasonable doubt, by the official count in New York that Grover Cleveland and T. A. Hendricks have been elected President and Vice-President of the United States, the committee having in charge the arrangements for a Jubilee in commemoration of the event announce that the demonstration will take place in the evening of WEDNESDAY THE 19TH INST.

The committee invite all citizens of Cairo and of the adjacent country, who are in favor of honest government to unite and cooperate with them in giving such significance to the demonstration as the importance of the questions determined by the election seems to demand. Evidences of exultation of the result by processions, music, bon-fires, fire-works, firing of cannon, sounding of horns, whistles and bells, decorations and illuminations of houses, and other similar exhibits of joy, will be fully justified and if reasonably indulged in, without offensive conduct to individuals, cannot properly be objected to.

Citizens having torches belonging to any of the Democratic organizations, are requested to return them immediately to the Arab engine house, that they may be filled and prepared for use, or prepare them themselves, if they prefer to do so, and bring them for use on the evening of the demonstration.

A programme of the particulars of the demonstration will be published in advance of the time fixed for it.
