THE BATTLE OF THE BLONDES

Renewal of the Menderson-Butler Controversy-Arrest of the Befendant Rutler.

The case of ALEXANDER HENDERSON UR. GEORGE H. BUTLER has been again revived. It will be remembered that about the first of June last, a certain article appeared in Wilkes' Spirit of the Times, commenting in sovere terms upon ALEXANDER HENDERSON, manager and halfowner of the Lydia Thompson Burleague Troupe. Mr. HENDERSON feeling himself aggrieved thereby, made efforts to discover the author, and through his counsel, demanded Mr. GEORGE name from WILKES. editor. Mr. WILKES expressing a willingness to share in the responsibility of the authorship, a suit was instituted against him for libel. Λ short time after the article appeared Mr. Butler appeared at Niblo's Garden after the close of the performance, and calling Mr. HENDERSON out, stated that he (BUTLER) was the author of the article complained of, at the same time attacking and beating Mr. HENDERson. Mr. Henderson preferred a charge against BUTLER at Jefferson Market for assault and battory, and the latter waiving an examination and giving bail, the papers were sont before the Grand Jury, but that body failed to find an iu-These articles continuing to be pubdictment. lished in the paper, and Mr. HENDERSON believing that they had some effect Union different citles 10 the about play. instituted to he Was against BUTLER auit for libel. laying his damages at \$50,000. On Thursday last, on application of Mr. John D. Townsend, counsel for Henderson, Judge Fithian granted an order of arrest, fixing the bail at \$5,000; and yestorday the defendant was arrested and gave the required bail, Mr. ALEXANDER M. STETSON and Mr. CHARLES DELMONICO being his bondsmen.
