

New Post Office Regulation. Assistant Postmaster Armstrong has brough our notice a new regulation of the Depart nent, to go in force on Nov. Ist, which every one, business men in particular, should be im-mediately advised of. By the present system letters deposited, not bearing the required stamp, are detained in the office where deposited while the Postmaster of the same advices the party to whom they are addressed, that such etter will be forwarded on receipt of the required stamp.

By the new role, soon to be inaugurated, all such letters are to be forwarded fortenith to the dead letter office at Washington, and immediately become dead letters. This will entail erious inconvenience and loss upon all parties who are inclutious in seeing their letters well and securely stamped, who will not be likely t deem the charge a wise or felicitous one. Every person who values promptness in disatching their correspondence, or even baving t dispatched at all, in the right direction, will pay a very strict regard to the matter of stemps and see them well secured to their letters. To do this it will be better not to lick all the gur off the stamp, but moisten it such a way as to enable it to give the greatest efficacy to its ad

Our Fire Department, Matters have come to be reduced to an excellent system and order under Chief Engineer Harris in our present Paid Steam Fire Department. The machines are kept in fine order and turn out with most commendable prompiness et an alarm. Both horses and men seem happily to understand one another and themselve and the signals from the Court House bell. On the second quick stroke the quadrupeds are or their feet in a state of great excitement. Not unfrequently, when the alarm finds the horse standing, harnessed to the machines, the beasts start of their own accord, and on one eccasion the animal attached to a hose cart got half : block away before his driver mounted to his seat. Whether he would have counted the strokes and made for the right district is an open question, but certainly the intelligence inherent in these horses, and quickened by habit, makes their manouvres on the occasion of a fire-alarm well worth watching. They run

like toxes, ears pricked forward, every nerve and muscle doing duty at top of pressure, and yet all intelligently and under control. Thus ich of the horses. The men bunk at the engine houses, and as speedy at turning out "when the bell rings."
